Thanking firefighters

Residents rally as Chimney Fire nears full containment

n Saturday, Aug. 27, the corner of Spring Street and 24th Street in Paso Robles was alive with residents out to thank firefighters for their efforts to extinguish the Chimney Fire, which has been burning since Aug. 13 and has destroyed 49 homes. Approx-imatlye 200 locals turned out for the event, many of them

waking up at 6 a.m. to arrive at Flamson Middle School in time to see the fire trucks driving by on their way to the fire.

Those in attendance waved signs and children whooped and hollered to support the heroes of the Chimney Fire.

Long-time Paso Robles resident Tara Peck was out with her friends and family at the event, hoisting American flags in the air and signs that read "Our Life Line," "Our Home," and "Thank you Firefighters."

Atascadero resident killed in Grover Beach hit-and-run

Second victim in serious condition

"It is really just amazing seeing an entire city's worth of firefighters come into our community and do so much to save homes, lives and our

countryside," she said.

As the morning progressed, more locals turned out with signs ready to thank the passing firefighters. As the firetrucks passed the throng of people lining the streets they waved, honked their horns and were all

As of Thursday morning the Chimney Fire is 91 percent containment and had not grown in size since Tuesday, Aug. 30, burning a total of 46,344 acres.

Cal Fire public information offi-

cer Brian Steiger said that full containment is expected to be reached Thursday, Sept. 1. "With only 9 percent left, 100

percent containment is expected by the late afternoon Thursday," he said. "The cause of the Chimney Fire is still under investigation.

Today, firefighters will continue to make progress toward full contain-ment of the fire. Crews will remain throughout the fire perimeter into next week to remove all firefighting

equipment."
Steiger said that all road clo sures have been lifted and asked that people who do not own homes or businesses in the affected areas stay

Red Cross mobile teams were driving through the communities af-fected by the Chimney Fire throughout the day on Saturday, Aug. 27, to distribute supplies

Volunteers provided residents with sifters, work gloves, shovels, tarps, masks, and more to help with Caseworkers were also on hand to work one-on-one with each family to provide financial assistance and

additional resources or referrals.

"In some cases these families have lost everything," said Regional Director of Communications Jessica Piffero. "There's so much to think about, from the cleanup, to paperwork, or simply buying new clothes.

Our volunteers are here to help make

that process a little easier."

Since the Chimney Fire began the North County and in particular citizens of Paso Robles have come together to support those who have lost their homes and to thank the more than 3,000 firefighters who have given up a month of their lives to stop the fire in its tracks.

wrote. "Atascadero claims to be business-friendly, but when a person wants to start a new business, City Hall puts up all kinds of stop signs such as high fees to get the planning portion done and other high fees. Mattson spent five years in Las Vegas after graduating where he found a passion for politics while working for a campaign management firm. He also spent two years living in Mammoth Lakes.

Mattson returned to Atascadero in 2006 to continue his education and in 2009 he began to dedicate his time to local nonprofit causes including postings with the Atascadero Grey-hound Foundation, the Atascadero Colony Days Committee, the Friends of the Atascadero Library, the Atascadero Printery Foundation and RISE.

Mattson married his high school sweetheart Hayley in 2012 and positioned his education to return to work, taking his current position as the sports editor at the Atascadero News while con-tinuing his nonprofit work

nuing his nonprofit work.

Mattson is the father of two boys, Mirac, 4, and Maximus, 2, and a 12-year-old stepdaughter

"As a resident of Atascadero since 1978, it has always been my home," Mattson wrote in his statement to the *Atascadero News*. "When I returned home in 2006, I found a community worth dedicating to. I spent the next 10 years in service, studying City action or inaction, and developing a clear concern. In the past year, my understanding of City politics has grown, as has my concern for where we decided to go as a community. I see a lack of energy in the City to support our 2009 Economic Development Strat-egy, designate concentrated zoning for effective economic synergy, enlist a residents-first philos-ophy, reconnect a fractured political fabric, and make Atascadero economically independent. Looking at the candidates running for the seat

of Mayor of Atascadero, I felt it was the right time to give Atascadero voters the opportunity to choose to put our past in perspective, and de-cide on our future."

Tom O'Malley and his wife Peggy are

third-generation residents of Atascadero and recently celebrated their 40th wedding anniver-sary. They have three children and seven grandchildren.

O'Malley has a bachelor's degree in eco-nomics from the University of California, Santa Barbara and a master's degree from Cal Poly. He has extensive financial and computer systems management experience in both the public and private sector. O'Malley and his wife operate the Portola Inn in Atascadero where they host wed-

dings and community fundraisers.

O'Malley is an active member of the Atascadero Chamber of Commerce and Chamber of Chambe scadero Kiwanis Club. He has founded many local fundraising events including the annual Ki-wanis Mayor's Winemaker Dinner, a Mother's Day Brunch for RISE, and a performance dinner supporting Cuesta College. He has served as the chairperson of multiple county organizations including the Economic Vitality Corporation and the Council of Governments

"Born and raised in Atascadero, I know the critical importance of two things: volunteerism and relationships," O'Malley wrote in his statement to the *Atascadero News*. "Volunteers like my Scout leader Charles Paddock, who started our zoo, have built this community. My rela-tionship with my father, one of our community's first firefighters, who built my childhood home, taught me a basic work ethic and that we can work together to solve any problem. I respect and support those traditions; traditions manifested by organizations like Peoples Self-Help Housing and others that offer people hope for housing and the important basics of life. These traditions lead us to build consensus on a longterm community vision and the plans to tackle complex issues. That vision is critical now. We are at a strategic crossroad. Others are investing in our community, more than ever before. Now is the time to guide that activity to preserve our heritage and guarantee a bright future for Ata-
